Foreword

Several agencies are involved in promoting industrial development in India at national and state level apart from Ministries/Departments. These include Public Sector Undertakings, Autonomous Bodies and other Organisations. Functions of some of these agencies are broad and general, covering the industrial sector as a whole whereas others are dedicated to certain specific promotional activities like promotion of MSMEs, skill development, entrepreneurship training, consultancy, finance, assistance in trading, infrastructure support etc.

One of the major objectives of Kerala Rubber Ltd (KRL) is promoting rubber-based industrialisation in the state. Initial focus will be on MSME sector. The perceived functions of KRL to accomplish its mandate may match, overlap, duplicate and supplement the functions of other industry promotion agencies. Appendix 1.

Schemes of NSDC

1. Pradhan Mantri Kaushal Vikas Yojana (PMKVY)

- ❖ Pradhan Mantri Kaushal Vikas Yojana (PMKVY) is the flagship scheme of the MSDE implemented by NSDC.
- ❖ Objective of this skill certification scheme is to enable Indian youth to take up industry relevant skill training that will help them in securing a better livelihood. Individuals with prior experience are also assessed and certified.
- ❖ Skill training is imparted under three categories: -
 - a. Short Term Training (STT)
 - b. Recognition of Prior Learning (RPL)
 - c. Special Project (SP)

a. Short Term Training

The Short-Term Training (STT) shall be implemented under both Central and State component of the scheme. STT shall have provision for both fresh skilling for trainees who are first time learners and reskilling for the trainees/existing workforce who have already undergone formal/informal skilling and need additional skill sets.

Target Beneficiaries:

- ❖ Aged between 15-45 years
- ❖ Possesses an Aadhaar card and an Aadhaar linked bank account
- ❖ Fulfils other criteria for the respective job role as defined by the awarding body

b. Recognition of Prior Learning (RPL)

RPL is a skill certification component to enable Indian youth to take on industry relevant skill certification which will help them to secure a better livelihood. Individuals with prior learning experience or skills can register themselves and get assessed and certified under the RPL component of PMKVY. It focuses mainly on individuals engaged in unregulated sectors. The objectives of RPL are primarily three-fold:

- ❖ To align the competencies of the pre-existing workforce of the country to the standardised National Skills Qualification Framework (NSQF).
- ❖ To enhance the employability and/or entrepreneurial opportunities of an individual.
- ❖ To provide opportunities for reducing inequalities based on privileging certain forms of knowledge over others.

c. Special Projects

Special Projects component of PMKVY envisages creation of a platform that will facilitate trainings in special areas and/or premises of government bodies, corporates or industry bodies, and training in special job roles, not defined under the available Qualification Packs (QPs)/National Occupational Standards (NOS). The objective of Special Projects under PMKVY 3.0 (2020-21) is to undertake project-based skilling interventions, primarily to meet the skilling needs of marginalised or vulnerable groups.

2. Pradhan Mantri Kaushal Kendra

Vocational training needs to be made aspirational to transform India into the skill capital of the world. In line with the same, MSDE intends to establish visible and aspirational Model

Training Centres (MTCs) in every district of the country. NSDC is the implementation agency for the project.

The model training centres envisage to:

- ❖ Create benchmark institutions that demonstrate aspirational value for competency-based skill development training.
- ❖ Focus on elements of quality, sustainability and connection with stakeholders in skills delivery process.
- ❖ Transform from a mandate-driven footloose model to a sustainable institutional model.

These training centres will be state-of-the-art MTCs, called Pradhan Mantri Kaushal Kendras (PMKK).

3. Technical Intern Training Programme (TITP)

TITP commenced in 1993 in Japan aims to contribute to developing countries by accepting its people and transferring skills through On-the-Job Training (OJT) in Japan. It promotes international cooperation through transfer of skills, techniques and knowledge gained by technical interns to the developing nations.

4. Specified Skilled Worker

Specified Skilled Worker is a new residency status that was introduced by the Government of Japan in April 2019, under which aspiring Indian youth can take up a job and stay in Japan. Japan introduced ‘Specified Skilled Worker’ to address the severe labour shortages in Japan by accepting foreign human resources with specific expertise and skills. As of January 2021, Japan has signed SSW Memorandum of Cooperation (MoC) with 13 nations including India. India and Japan signed a Memorandum of Cooperation in January 2021 for the implementation of ‘Specified Skilled Worker’ between India and Japan.

Schemes operated by DIC

1. Entrepreneur Support Scheme (ESS)

- Provides subsidy for investment in land, building, plant & machinery, electrification, essential office equipments, pollution control devices and other fixed assets.
- For General Category, assistance is 15% of the capital investment limited to Rs. 30 lakh.
- For Young (18 to 45 years), Women, SC/ST and Non-Resident Keralite (NRK) entrepreneurs, the assistance is 25% limited to Rs. 40 lakh.
- Enterprises in priority sectors are eligible for an additional assistance of 10% limited to Rs. 10 lakh.
- MSMEs started in Idukki, Wayanad, Kasaragod and Pathanamthitta districts are eligible for an additional support of 10% limited to Rs. 10 lakh.
- Enterprises setup after acquiring new technology from approved research institutions are eligible for an additional support of 10% limited to Rs. 10 lakh.
- Total eligible assistance for an enterprise is limited to Rs. 40 lakh.

Stages in ESS

- i. Start-up support
- ii. Investment support
- iii. Technology support

2. Prime Minister Employment Generation Programme [PMEGP]

- To generate employment opportunities in rural as well as urban areas of the country through setting up of new self-employment ventures/projects/micro enterprises.
- PMEGP is applicable to all new viable micro enterprises, including Village Industries projects except activities indicated in the negative list of Village Industries.
- Existing/old units are not eligible.

Level of Financial Assistance

- Maximum cost of the project/unit admissible for Margin Money Subsidy under manufacturing sector is Rs. 50 lakhs.
- Maximum cost of the project/unit admissible for Margin Money Subsidy under Business/Service sector is Rs. 20 Lakhs.
- Balance amount (excluding the own contribution) of the total project cost will be provided by Banks.
- If the total project cost exceeds Rs. 50 lakhs or Rs. 20 Lakhs for Manufacturing and Service/Business sector respectively, the balance amount may be provided by Banks without any Government subsidy.
- Urban area includes Municipality & Corporation, Rural area includes village/Panchayat.

2nd Loan for upgradation of existing PMEGP / REGP / MUDRA units

- Maximum cost of the project/unit admissible for Margin Money Subsidy under manufacturing sector for upgradation is Rs. 1.00 Crore. Maximum subsidy would be Rs. 15 lakh (Rs. 20 lakh for NER and Hill States).

- Maximum cost of the project/unit admissible for Margin Money Subsidy under business/service sector for upgradation is Rs. 25 lakhs. Maximum subsidy would be Rs. 3.75 lakh (Rs. 5 lakh for NER and Hill States).
- Balance amount (excluding the own contribution) of the total project cost will be provided by Banks.
- If the total project cost exceeds Rs. 1.00 Crore or Rs. 25.00 lakhs for manufacturing and service/business sector respectively, the balance amount may be provided by banks without any Government subsidy.

Eligibility Conditions

- Any individual, above 18 years of age.
- There will be no income ceiling and no upper age limit for assistance for setting up projects under PMEGP.
- For setting up of project costing above Rs. 10 lakh in the manufacturing sector and above Rs. 5 lakhs in the business /service sector, the beneficiaries should possess at least VIII standard pass educational qualification.
- Assistance under the scheme is available only for new projects sanctioned specifically under the PMEGP.
- Existing Units (under PMRY, REGP or any other scheme of Government of India or State Government) and the units that have already availed Government Subsidy under any other scheme of Government of India or State Government are not eligible.

3. Margin Money Grant to Nano Units

- Aims to provide financial assistance to Nano units in the State, engaged in manufacturing, job work and service activity having any type of value addition.

- Units with project cost up to 10 Lakh are covered.
- Margin Money Grant of 30% to 40% of the total project cost according to the category of the applicant.
- Women, Youth (Age between 18 and 40), Differentially Abled Persons, Ex-Servicemen, and persons belonging to SC/ST category will be eligible for 10% additional Grant.
- 30% of the beneficiaries under the scheme shall be women entrepreneurs.
- Maximum assistance under this scheme shall be Rs. 4 Lakh per unit.

4. One Family One Enterprise (OFOE)

- Envisages encouraging entrepreneurial activity in every household and to provide interest subvention for loan amount up to Rs. 10 lakh (for fixed capital loan and/ or working capital loan) of the project cost.
- All new micro, small and medium enterprises in manufacturing, service and trading activities, which availed Term Loan and/or Working Capital Loan, shall be eligible for assistance under this scheme.
- The MSME units, which commenced operation/production on or after 1/4/2022, are eligible for assistance.
- Units shall have a valid Udyam registration.
- As on the date of submission of the claim, the loan accounts should not have been declared as NPA as per extant guidelines in force.
- Units shall be working as on date of application.
- Units shall not have availed any grant assistance under any scheme of Central Government/State Government/ Local Self Government Department.

5. PM Formalisation of Micro Food processing Enterprises Scheme (PM FME Scheme)

- Enhance the competitiveness of existing individual micro-enterprises in the unorganised segment of the food processing industry and promote formalisation of the sector.
- Support Farmer Producer Organisations (FPOs), Self Help Groups (SHGs) and Producers Cooperatives along their entire value chain.

6. Scheme for Interest Subvention to Nano Household Enterprises

- Intends to provide financial assistance in the form of interest subvention to nano and household enterprises on a reimbursement basis for the term loan availed by the unit.
- Units engaged in the manufacturing, services and job work can apply.

Benefit of the scheme

- Units are eligible for interest subvention up to 6% per annum for the term loan availed on reimbursement basis for 3 years.
- For Women and SC/ST enterprises, the interest subvention is 8%.
- Assistance is limited to the fixed percentage of the composite investment upon
 - a) plant & machinery,
 - b) other fixed assets including essential office equipments and
 - c) electrification.
- Cost of Land and Building shall not be included in the Fixed Capital Investment.

- In the event of default of re-payment of loan with interest at the end of 1st year, the subvention will not be passed. The same is applicable for 2nd and 3rd years.

7. Revival and Rehabilitation Scheme for Defunct MSMEs and Cashew processing units

- Envisages supporting defunct MSMEs in the manufacturing sector including cashew processing units through assistance as capital grants and working capital incentives.
- All MSMEs in the manufacturing sector which are defunct for at least 6 months due to genuine issues including cashew processing enterprises that have potential to be revived and rehabilitated are eligible.

8. Kerala stressed MSMEs Revival & Rehabilitation Scheme

- Intends to provide financial and other handholding support to the MSMEs which show signs of stress and to convert their non-productive assets into productive assets.
- Maximum assistance admissible for each unit, all reliefs and assistance put together, under the scheme will be limited to Rs. 5 Lakh.

Assistance/relief available are for:

- Restructuring of existing loan account;
- Restart expenses; and
- Clearance of statutory dues

9. Assistance to Skilled Entrepreneurs Development Centres

- Provides better employment opportunities to skilled workers in the unorganised sector in Kerala, transforming the unskilled workers into experts in the relevant field through skill development training, providing the required

work tools to the workers and providing a better work-friendly environment to the society.

- Government of Kerala aims to form one or more Industrial Co-operative Societies within the territorial boundaries of each Local Self Government Institution in the State and accordingly those working in different occupations shall come forward to avail of the benefits.

Eligibility

- Industrial Co-operative Societies formed to implement the objectives of providing better employment opportunities to workers engaged in various types of employment in the unorganised sector and bringing unskilled workers to the mainstream through skill development training are eligible.
- Societies registered during or after the financial year 2019-2020.
- Societies have at least 50 members. In that, at least 25 members should be skilled workers and the remaining 25 members should be semi-skilled / unskilled workers.
- Societies applying for assistance should have an elected board of Directors and paid Secretary.

Financial Assistance under the scheme

- Maximum benefit per Society under this scheme will be Rs. 2 lakhs. Out of the total allocation, 78% will be for fixed asset creation, 20% for working capital and 2% for training.
- Number of members in the group will also be taken into account to calculate the financial benefit to the group. There should be 100 active members to be eligible for the maximum benefit of Rs. 2 lakh. Financial assistance will be decrease in proportion to the decrease in membership.

- Societies which do not receive maximum benefit due to less membership will be entitled to the remaining amount of financial assistance as long as the scheme exists, if the membership rises above the prescribed criteria. But in any case, it will not allow more than two times.
- Working capital will be sanctioned at the rate of Rs. 1000/- per number of active members.
- Grant sanctioned to the Society shall be released through the bank A/C jointly by the society & General Manager, District Industrial Centre and will be withdrawn only with the permission of the General Manager, DIC.

10. Assistance Scheme for Handicrafts Artisans (ASHA)

- Intends to provide financial assistance in the form of grant to e-artisans in handicrafts sector for setting up handicraft enterprises. Assistance is a one-time support to eligible artisans of the state as back-end assistance.

11. Scheme for Interest Subvention on Term Loan and Working Capital Loan

The scheme has been introduced to assist the MSME units which were badly affected due to the economic crisis in the wake of COVID-19 pandemic.

Eligibility

- Should be an MSME in the manufacturing or job work category established in the state.
- Should have filed Udyam with the competent authority, after commencing the commercial production.
- Unit should have been operational at least for a period of 3 months within a period of 6 months prior to the date of sanction of bank loan.
